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Updates

"CONTINUITY AND CHANGE" - MINISTER'S STATEMENT

Jeff Cuthbert, Minister for the Third Sector made a statement in the Senedd on 12 November setting out future direction for the relationship between Welsh Government (WG) and the Third Sector. It mainly focussed on the future of Infrastructure support which includes WCVA, CVCs and Volunteer Centres. The statement and a subsequent letter to Voluntary Councils makes it clear that Welsh Government is pushing for stronger regional working and greater alignment with their priorities which include reducing poverty and promoting community volunteering. The Minister stated that when proposing a formula for distribution of funding for the Infrastructure he will take account of the discussions about regional working, tackling poverty, population and geography. There are serious concerns that North Wales could lose out significantly and Sandy Mewies posed a question in the Senedd to highlight this issue.

A unique element of the relationship between the Third Sector and Welsh Government is that it is based on legislation, the Voluntary Sector Scheme, which will be updated alongside the Funding Code of Practice. The Minister stated that the Third Sector Partnership Council and Ministerial Meetings were valuable vehicles for communication but needed re-energising and this would form part of the recommendations. There will be further meetings between WG and CVCs to discuss the detailed proposals.

SURPLUS FOOD - MISSING OUT?

The Fareshare scheme is now operating in Flintshire and Wrexham managed by Crest Co-

operative. At a recent meeting in Corlan, David Morris from Crest explained to a small number of Flintshire voluntary groups how they can have good surplus food delivered on a regular basis. The scheme can save your organisation money, allows you to into landfill. If you provide food for luncheon clubs, run a hostel, residential home or day centre then the scheme will save you money. The scheme is operated by Crest Cooperative and is easy to join. NESTA, THE HERITAGE LOTTERY AND THE BIG LOTTERY LAUNCH RETHINKING PARKS

Voluntary and community sector organisations and public sector organisations from across the UK may apply for grants of between £50,001 and £100,000 as well as non financial support to carry out their innovative ideas to make the UK's public parks financially sustainable.

The grants programme will help park managers and those responsible for park funding and maintenance to test new options for generating income and managing their park. Grants can be used to fund new staff, external consultancy and advice, training for staff and volunteers, publicity and marketing, equipment and limited capital works.

There is a two stage application process.

The first stage is a series of free workshops and training sessions, which organisations are strongly encouraged to attend. The free workshops will be held in January 2014 to provide information about how to submit an Expression of Interest for funding.

The workshops are currently scheduled for:

- London 14 January.
- Edinburgh 23 January.
- Cardiff 28 January.
- Belfast 30 January.

Those who cannot attend these workshops may attend an online workshop on either 16 January or 21 January. Shortlisted organisations from Stage 1 will be invited to attend a practical innovation workshop in March 2014. Expressions of Interest will be reviewed and shortlisted organisations invited to submit a proposal. Organisations interested in attending the January

workshops should register their interest on the Nesta website www.nesta.org.uk

The second stage will see shortlisted organisations submitting their full proposals in April 2014. Grant recipients will have 18 months (from July 2014 to December 2015) to implement their innovations.

WALES ECONOMIC GROWTH FUND 2 - LAUNCH OF SECOND 2013 PHASE

The Welsh Government has opened the second 2013 phase of its Wales Economic Growth Fund – a £30m economic stimulus designed to help private and social enterprises through the prevailing economic downturn.

The initiative is a short-term, fast-track fund for Welsh businesses and social enterprises, providing immediate access to non-repayable capital funding for investments that will create and retain employment opportunities, growth and wealth. Funding allocations for 2013 are delivered in two phases. Phase 1, which has now completed, provided grants of between £50,000 and £100,000 for smaller enterprises. The current phase, Phase 2, is providing grants of £100,000 and over for those enterprises requiring larger investments.

Eligible expenditure can include new investment in capital assets (machinery, computer equipment, buildings etc). Intellectual property bought from a third party, professional fees and other one off costs related to the investment may also be eligible. Additionally, revenue costs associated with the capital investment can be funded.

Wales-based organisations operating within the private and non-profit social enterprise sectors that have projects planned to improve productivity and create and maintain jobs may be eligible for support.

BBC CHILDREN IN NEED (Main Grants)

BBC Children in Need is an annual charity appeal organised by the BBC. Every year the BBC dedicates one evening of programming to showcase events aimed at raising money for charities working with young people in the UK. The next deadline is 15 January 2014.

The Trust distributes the funds raised each year as grants to organisations that work with disadvantaged children and young people, under the age of 18, living in the UK. Grants of over £10,000 are available to support projects for up to three years.

There is no upper limit for Main Grants but very few grants over £100,000 are made and most grants are for much less

Funding is available to organisations that are supporting children and young people of 18 years and under who are experiencing disadvantage through:

- Illness, distress, abuse or neglect.
- Any kind of disability.
- Behavioural or psychological difficulties.
- Living in poverty or situations of deprivation.

Organisations must be working to combat this disadvantage and to make a real difference to children and young people's lives.

HEART RESEARCH UK AND SUBWAY HEALTHY HEART GRANTS

The grants support new and innovative projects designed to promote heart health and to prevent or reduce the risks of heart disease in specific groups or communities with a deadline of 6 January 2014 for the Wales, HTV region. Grants of between £1,000 and £10,000 are available.

The Healthy Heart Grant is for original, innovative heart health projects only, and not for general healthy lifestyle projects. Projects must focus on, and actively promote, heart health or reduce the risk of heart disease for the duration of the project.

The cost of travel may be included in a Healthy Heart Grant application provided it forms a necessary and integral part of the Healthy Heart project. The costs of attending meetings and conferences may also be covered if the necessary supporting documentation is included in the application.

Any equipment bought must be used for the Healthy Heart project only. The cost cannot exceed 50% of the total amount of the grant application or £2,000 in total. Community and voluntary organisations, registered charities and other not-for-profit organisations in the UK are eligible to apply. For further detail go to -http://

Flintshire can now join together to reduce its energy bills

The switch, called Cyd Cymru/Wales Together, is being run by Cardiff Council and the Vale of Glamorgan Council, in partnership with the Energy Saving Trust, but is open to everyone in Wales. The idea is to group together and bulk buy energy, so we get a cheaper price. Collectively, we can save more.



The first step is to register your interest and provide some information about your energy use. An energy auction will then take place, where energy suppliers will give their best price to everyone that has registered. Next, you will be contacted with a personal offer for you, based on the information you have provided. You are under no obligation to switch, and if you accept the offer, you will be assisted to switch to the new cheaper tariff.

This is the first time we've tried a free collective switch in Wales, and our scheme is backed by the Welsh Government. We've seen great results in similar switching schemes across the UK and Europe. At a time when the costs of energy seem to be going up, ways to save some money have never been more important.

Everyone in Wales is welcome to join the scheme, and the more people we can get to sign up, the better discounts we can negotiate with the energy supplier.

TRANSFORMING ACCESS TO HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE SERVICES

Funded through the WG regional collaboration fund a new project 'Transforming Access to Health and Social Care Services' is being implemented across North Wales.

The vision being 'to create a new, streamlined, way for adults across North Wales to gain access to advice, assessment and co-ordinated community Health and Social Care services, by contacting just one telephone number.'

The Single Point of Access will be developed regionally, but delivered locally with the principle of sustainable partnership working central to the programme's overall success.

Local Authorities, the Health Board and the Voluntary Sector via the CVCs have been involved in the development of the programme. A regional programme manager has been appointed and the process is underway in appointing county project managers. As part of the regional programme two third sector posts have been appointed to achieve the following as part of the wider programme:

• To ensure that both voluntary and independent

- sector organisations across North Wales are involved in the Regional Transforming Access Programme.
- To ensure that appropriate attendance at regional workstream meetings and local Single Point of Access meetings.
- To specifically ensure that Single Points of Access are provided with comprehensive information regarding voluntary and independent sector services.
- To be fully engaged in discussions regarding workforce and workforce training within Single Points of Access.
- To respond to requirements for the development of further capacity at a community level, taking forward pilot projects within independent and voluntary sector partners

Over 300 local people have taken advantage of the free information and training offered by 'Get Online Wrexham Flintshire', a project aiming to take the fear out of computers and the internet, and promote the benefits of getting online.

The project is supported by a team of dedicated, enthusiastic and empathetic volunteers who lead and support short, informal 'Absolute beginners' courses for people with little or no experience of computers and the internet.

Short courses are also offered to those who've already mastered the basics. The 'Pass I.T. On' workshop is designed to encourage IT users to share their skills with an absolute beginner, providing an overview of digital exclusion and its ramifications and lots of hints, tips and tools for



coaxing and coaching people online. For those seeking employment, the 'Web for work' course introduces online resources to help plan and manage job hunting more effectively.

Project leader Kevin Roberts says, 'I'm really pleased that despite being up and running for just six months, we've surpassed our expectations and helped over 300 local people to better understand digital technology, and appreciate how the internet can make

their everyday lives easier. Interest in the project continues to grow and we look forward to spreading the word further throughout 2014.' Strange things can happen to unwary travellers who venture into the country on misty, moist November afternoons! We were a group of seven. It was 5 November and we were at the Wildlife Centre in Rhydymwyn. We were met by the Volunteer Co-ordinator, smiling cheerily and ready to meet the "gang". There was myself, my colleague Matt and our band of four volunteers. There were two year eleven students and two nine year old primary school pupils, all eager and raring to go! We were going to prepare, build and light a bonfire in the woods, under the strict supervision of our guide of course! The crème de la crème of this event was to be the toasting and melting of marshmallows, pierced and



perched on sticks and held close to the ever warming flames. We all learnt so much in the space of two hours. For example, did you know that the carefully peeled bark of the Mountain Ash can act as an aid to lighting a fire? We walked about half a mile through the centre, way up into the woods. Along the road the group carefully snapped dead and withered branches, together with strips of bark, all to be gainfully employed as fuel for our fire. What a great lesson that outdoor walk was, with lots of looking and touching lots of trees and walking through thick layers of dead, forgotten leaves. After a fair climb and stepping over dead roots and branches we arrived at our clearing and, under strict guidance, the fire was lit. Everyone sat in the circle and enjoyed the


crackling and waves of smoke. Yes, the marshmallows were roasted, toasted and enjoyed. Our little group behaved perfectly. The older pupils helped in supervising the younger boys and they each helped me as we wound our way down the road! This was much appreciated! This had been such a good afternoon with so much incidental learning and information given.

It's been a busy but enjoyable term. The highlight of this term has been the onset of the Mentoring programme which enables young volunteers to cascade their skills to both peers and younger pupils. The project has so far has taken a number of forms. One of these forms has seen two young people being taught basic coaching skills through basketball, which has led to them helping deliver coaching

sessions in local primary schools which will culminate in a basketball festival. This has also built links with Flintshire Sports Development through which these young coaches have started their Basketball Leaders coaching qualification.

Another aspect of the project has seen us building an excellent relationship with Bryn Coch primary school and led to these young people being given the responsibility of being lunchtime play leaders running coaching sessions to engage groups at break time.

The final element of the project has utilised these young people as





have been referred to the project. These mentors do the activities in one session and then pass on the skills they have learned in the next. The responsibility has had a very positive effect on the mentors and has given positive role models to the younger children.

What other activities have we done? Visits to Clwyd Special Riding Centre, North Clwyd Animal Rescue, and "taster" sessions in the Foodbank, an excellent cafe in Holywell, Loggerheads plus cooking, baking and basketball training at the Delyn Centre.

Thank you to all the organisations that have enabled these to happen.

Between now and Christmas Chris Ablett offered IT workshops. Hair and beauty sessions have been booked at Coleg Cambria which will prove valuable to those who attend. On 16 December the group will entertain Holywell Autumn Club – an event we have done for the past six years and hope that this year will be as pleasing as the past.

After all the "popping on" of aprons, serving tea, coffee, cakes and mince pies – what next? High tea at the Ritz... maybe?

When your number is up..According to The World Bank life expectancy in the UK is '80.75' (2011) which is up from '71.13' (1960) which is good news for those selling Happy 80th Birthday cards. It is also estimated by the DWP that a quarter of those currently under 16 will become centenarians.. although on the positive side they may have moved out of the family home and got their own place by then!

All I want for Christmas is... to know when and how much my Pension is.

In October 2012, the Government introduced new pension legislation in an attempt to address the issue of increased life expectancy, coupled with insufficient retirement savings. Auto-enrolment, is being phased in with the emphasis on the employer to include a minimum pension provision for its employees.

Auto enrolment is already in place for large organisations including big charities such as the NSPCC. Although, it will be between 1 June 2015 and April 2017 before most organisations with fewer than 50 employees have to auto enrol. Check your staging (start date) by inputting the Employer PAYE into the Pensions calculator. {www.thepensionsregulator.gov.uk/employers/tools/staging-date}

However, it is still important to plan ahead as there are financial and administrative obligations including minimum contribution payments which increase over time. The employer has to pay a set % of these, but it might be that the organisation can pay all of the required contributions or more.

Date	Employer minimum contribution	Total minimum contribution
Employer's staging date to 30 September 2017	1%	2%
1 October 2017 to 30 September 2018	2%	5%
1 October 2018 onwards	3%	8%

Luxury SPA ... You may already be dreaming of that luxury spa upon retirement but before you do, check your SPA, as your individual State Pension Age (SPA) {www.gov.uk/calculate-state-pension} is likely to change. The government has already proposed to accelerate the SPA changes, which will increase SPA from 65 to 66 by 2020, and to 67 between 2026 and 2028.
