Month-long campaign to raise awareness of screening

Public Health Wales is launching its fifth annual 'Screening for Life' campaign on 1 July to raise awareness of the free national screening programmes offered by the NHS.

The month-long campaign is aimed at encouraging eligible men, women and children across Wales to take up free NHS screening.

Throughout the month, Public Health Wales's Screening Engagement Team will be working with GP Practices across Wales, training members of staff as "screening champions" to talk to patients about screening.

Each of the programmes aimed at adults will be targeting specific groups during the month:

- Breast Test Wales will be encouraging women being invited for screening for the first time to take up their screening invitations
- Bowel Screening Wales are asking men, who tend to engage with the programme less than women, to consider returning their test kit
- The Wales Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening Programme will be targeting men eligible for screening who are still working and encouraging them to take time out to attend their appointment
- Similarly, Diabetic Eye Screening Wales the newest programme to join Public Health Wales will be encouraging people eligible for screening who are at work to make sure they attend
- Cervical Screening Wales will be calling on younger women who have been for a smear test to talk to their older relatives or friends about the importance of attending

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There are many ways in which you can get involved in the campaign. There is a free Screening for Life resource pack available on the website which will give you useful ideas and information to help you run screening ever and activities. A new screening 'z card' resource is now available. The pocket sized resource contains signposting information on all of the national screening programmes. The resource is ideal as a quick reference guide for professionals, and for handing out to people wanting to find out more about the services available.

Dr Sharon Hillier, Acting Director of Screening for Public Health Wales, said: "This is the fifth year of Screening For Life, which has run very successfully since 2013 and has seen us speak to thousands of people about screening.

"With four adult screening programmes, one screening both adults and children, and three maternal and child screening programmes running in Wales, it can be confusing to know which programmes you are eligible for, and how to take part, and we look forward to answering any questions people may have.

"We know that some people ignore their screening invitation. Screening really can save your life, and we would urge everyone invited to have a good look at the information we send them and really consider attending for screening."

The campaign will be promoted on social media, including a Facebook Live chat with Dr Sikha De Souza, consultant in screening, who will be answering questions about screening live online on Monday 31 July.
