FUNDING

Morgan Foundation

Grants are available to small to mediumsized registered charities and charitable organisations working with children and families or people who are older, disabled or socially isolated in North Wales, Merseyside, West Cheshire and North Shropshire. The Foundation has a grants programme of more than £2 million per year.

The type, size and time period of a grant is decided on the basis of the perceived 'difference' that the Foundation's support

will make to the organisation, to the project and to the targeted beneficiaries.

Archbishop of Wales Fund for Children

Grants are available to not-for-profit organisations working with children and their families in Wales. Awards are generally made between £100 and £5,000. Applications for higher levels of funding may be considered if a proposal has exceptional circumstances.

BBC Children in Need

Main Grants Programme

Grants for not-for-profit organisations that are working with disadvantaged children and young people who are 18 years old and younger living in the UK. Grants of over £10,000 are available to support projects for up to three years.

There is no upper limit for Main Grants but very few grants over £120,000 (or £40,000 per year) are made and most grants are for much less.

Small Grants Programme

Grants for not-for-profit organisations that are working with disadvantaged children and young people who are 18 years old and younger living in the UK, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands.

Grants of up to £10,000 are available per year for up to three years (£30,000 total request).



Esmée Fairbairn Foundation - Young People Leaving Care Funding

Funding is available to support young care leavers to feel emotionally stable and be financially secure, ultimately making a successful transition to independence. There is no minimum or maximum level of grant and no specified length of time for funding.

In 2015, the Foundation's median average grant was £100,000 over three years.

Henry Smith Charity

Holiday Grants for Children

Grants are available for schools, youth groups, not-for-profit organisations and charities to provide access to recreational trips or holidays for groups of children who experience disadvantage or who have disabilities. Maximum Value: £ 2,500 Grants of between £500 and £2,500 are available. Funding is available for a maximum of two consecutive years.

Main Grants Programmes

Revenue grants are available for projects involved with health and social welfare in the UK, including the Isle of Man and Channel Islands.

Revenue funding of £10,000 or more per year for up to three years for core costs (including salaries and overheads), or the running costs of a specific project

(including staffing costs). The amount requested must be at least £10,000 in each year. The maximum length of funding that can be requested is three years.

There is no maximum or minimum level of grant, although it is unusual for a grant of less than £10,000 to be made. In some situations the Trust may make a short-term loan.

Hawarden & District Relief in Need Fund

The Hawarden & District Relief in Need Charity will provide support to the following themes:

- Groups and organisations supporting vulnerable people
- Individuals with limited resources

FUNDING

Who can apply:

- Groups and organisations working with people who reside in the ancient parish of Hawarden ie. the predominant beneficiaries must be from the parish.
- Individuals living in the ancient parish of Hawarden

Please note: The ancient parish of Hawarden consists of the following modern wards - Aston, Broughton East, Broughton West, Buckley Pentrobin, Ewloe, Hawarden, Mancot, Saltney Mold Junction, Saltney Stonebridge, Sealand, Shotton East,

Shotton Higher, Shotton West.

Grants available:

- Individuals and organisations can apply for grants of up to £750
- Examples of what can be funded include:
- Equipment and activities for Hawarden-based community groups/charities working with vulnerable people in need
- Purchase of critical household items eg white goods, bedding, carpets etc
- Items essential to alleviating the suffering of food and fuel poverty (e.g. food parcels, blankets, hot water bottles, thermals, boiler repairs)
- Essential repairs and/or redecoration
- Luncheon clubs, food co-ops, activities that promote community cohesion, reduce isolation and alleviate poverty

Comic Relief Core Strength Local Communities Programme

Aims:

This programme is responding to the growing need of small locally led groups to cover their day to day

costs. The aim is to provide funding for groups' core costs - meaning expenditure that is not connected to delivering projects but focusing on investing in the organisation as a whole, such as basic running costs. We know securing core funding can be tough and want to use this programme to help support those doing much needed work in their local communities.

People living in areas of disadvantage or who face social issues often get vital support from smaller local groups based within their communities. It is these locally based groups that truly understand the needs of the people they serve and make a huge difference to their lives.

The Grant shall be used to support groups that can evidence a sustained beneficial impact on people's lives who are excluded or disadvantaged; this may be through low income, rural or social isolation, age, disabilities, race, sexuality or gender. Priority is to be given to small, locally based groups or organisations in areas of disadvantage that have a clear understanding of the needs of their community and are undertaking actions as a means of addressing these needs.

Awards Available:

- Grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 will be available.

When can you apply?

The programme will have a deadline:

- 30th March 2018

We are open for applications from a month prior to the deadline. Applicants will be informed of the outcome within 2 months of the deadline.

An Online Application Form is available on the Community Foundation in Wales website. Please note if you submit your application outside the above time period your application will be ineligible.

Groundwork - New Programme

Engage I Advance 2 is an innovative TWO PART programme creating new opportunities for 16-24 year olds in Wrexham and Flintshire

- I. As part of ENGAGE I young people will successfully complete a two week intense employability course. On successful completion some will progress and become a 'Groundwork Achiever' moving on to the next stage of the programme.
- **2.** ADVANCE 2 consists of us working alongside local businesses and third sector organisations to create paid work placements for our GROUNDWORK ACHIEVERS who will all be 'work ready' and raring to start.

GROUNDWORK ACHIEVERS will get an invaluable opportunity and experience and will be paid National Minimum Wage for 16 or 24 weeks (for minimum 30 hours per week). We will work to ensure their placement, employer and job role is mutually suitable for both themselves and the employer.

At the end of the programme we would hope continued employment could be an option for our Groundwork Achievers; however where this isn't possible we would support them in entering an apprenticeship, alternative employment or further learning/training.

This programme is funded through the European Social Fund and as with all ESF Funding there is an eligibility criteria that participants have to meet. We will assess individual referrals as and when they happen.

Our plan is to run our first Engage I week commencing 4th December with the plan to start our first work placement opportunities in January 2018.

My colleague Kay Harrison is going to be co-ordinating the project, she or I would be happy to come and talk to you, your colleagues, teams and any young people you are working with currently or have done in the past who you feel could benefit from this programme.

Vy Cochran, who worked for more than 10 years as Community Development Project Officer with Wales & West Housing, has now joined the charity Shine as a development worker.


Shine provides specialist support from before birth and throughout the life of anyone living with spina bifida and/or hydrocephalus, as well as to parents, families, carers and professional care staff.

Vy will be working with colleagues across Wales to deliver the Shining Lights service, which aims to build a wide programme of support for anyone in Wales whose life is affected by spina bifida and hydrocephalus.

These complex, life-threatening conditions often go together, although hydrocephalus can also occur later in life. Symptoms may be hidden or misunderstood, and can affect a person's mobility, coordination, thinking, memory and quality of life. The increased life expectancy brought about by medical advances is also bringing with it new health challenges with age.

Shine works to enable members to access quality services, education and lifelong opportunities. The new Shining Lights service is supported by funding from the Big Lottery Wales.

Magi Ann wins national award

Welsh icon Cerys Matthews, pays Magi Ann a surprise visit

Magi Ann received a very special visitor during one of her Story and Song on the 29th of August. Those attending the session were surprised to see Magi Ann being led into the session at Wrexham Library by famous singer Cerys Matthews. Cerys and the BBC cameras came to announce the good news, that the Magi Ann apps had won the Best Education Project in the 2017 National Lottery Awards.

The project received their National Lottery Award along with a £5,000 prize at a glittering Award Ceremony that was broadcast on BBC One across Britain.

These Awards are held annually and gives the British public the opportunity to vote for their favourite projects funded by the National Lottery. The Magi Ann apps reached the Awards short list out of 1,300 nominations, and were the only Welsh language project to reach the final round.

Gill Stephen, Menter laith Fflint a Wrecsam Chief Officer said:

"Because of their close involvement with local communities the Mentrau laith are in a unique position to be able to create suitable resources to meet the needs of the areas they work in. This award is a tribute to the local community here who have been an invaluable source of help and support throughout the project. I would like to thank everyone who voted for us and gave us the opportunity to introduce the Welsh language, which is an integral part of the lives of the people of Wales, to so many people across the other countries within the UK."

Resilient Communities : A Third Sector Perspective

WCVA has been working with members and a range of partners to develop proposals on developing more resilient communities. Within this, we're particularly interested in what needs to happen to achieve more empowered communities. We have shared these proposals with Welsh Government in the form of a paper from the third sector.

What did we do?

We have worked with a range of third sector networks in Wales to stimulate discussion within the sector. These include BAME Alliance, Children in Wales, CWVYS, DTA Cymru, Interfaith Council for Wales, Third Sector Support Wales, Urdd Gobaith Cymru and Wales Equality Group. We've also drawn on the knowledge, experience and networks of our Communities First Support Service.

To support initial ideas, we developed a joint discussion paper with Talwrn. This had a

number of questions to help get us thinking. We hope it will also be useful for other groups to develop their own thinking.

We hosted a number of discussion sessions online and face to face over the summer and autumn of 2017. These were opportunities to share and discuss different ideas from across and beyond the sector. This included our panel debate at WCVA's stand at the 2017 Eisteddfod. which is now available to view.

We launched a series of blogs on the theme of resilient communities, beginning with a look at how community anchors can be key to local action. We love to hear feedback, so if you have any thoughts, please leave a comment on a blog or email help@wcva.org.uk.

We're also keen to link with others working in this area. If you are, please get in touch. For example, we've hosted two roundtable sessions with Carnegie UK Trust to discuss implications from their Turnaround Towns work for towns in Wales.

We will continue to monitor developments in this area, and let the sector know about any further opportunities to get its voice heard by Welsh Government.

How Good Is Your Governance?

During Trustee's Week and Safeguarding Week, Third Sector Support Wales partners delivered events in Baglan and Conwy for trustees and third sector organisations to raise awareness of the principles of good governance, and provide the most up to date information, tools and guidance to support charities to improve practices.

The Charity Commission spoke about the seven principles of good governance of the UK Charity Governance Code, which supersedes its previous guidance on 'The Hallmarks of an Effective Charity'.

Read a blog from Rosie Chapman, Chair of the UK good governance code steering group, encouraging organisations to adopt the Code and make a public commitment to the principles. PQASSO for Wales was promoted as a practical process for organisations to work through to strengthen governance, and free WCVA resources, Faith and hope don't run charities (trustees do) and the Governance health check were recommended as useful tools.

Workshops were held to identify good practice and common challenges with participants confirming that more information is needed to keep trustee knowledge up to date, peer support, and trustee recruitment and diversity, reflecting the key findings of a major report published by the Charity Commission this week Taken on Trust: the Awareness and Effectiveness of Charity Trustees in England & Wales.

Feedback gathered from the workshops will help inform our ongoing programme of support on good governance. TSSW is also interested in inviting organisations to register their interest in future discussions and focus groups. We want to know more your ideas on good governance, the
