All County Voluntary Councils across Wales now join WCVA as part of Third Sector Support Wales (TSSW) – a partnership of country-wide Third Sector Support organisations. The Business Plan for TSSW will form four strands of work

- volunteering,
- sustainable funding,
- good governance and
- strategic engagement and influencing

We look forward to working with our TSSW partners to maximise the effectiveness of Welsh Government's investment in the Third Sector Infrastructure.

Thank you to everyone who submitted a response to our online (and paper-based) survey regarding support needs for voluntary and community groups. Some of the findings from the survey were:

81 % of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that there is a need for additional support for Third Sector Organisations to train and support their volunteers and trustees

73 % of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that there is a need for mentoring/peer support for Trustees within Third Sector organisations

37% of organisations indicated a need for support with a Trustee Induction Course

41% of organisations indicated a need for support with a Volunteer Induction Course

51% of organisations indicated a need for support with Volunteer Management for Staff

We will use our findings to help shape our own Business Plan, and to inform our work with local, regional and national partner organisations.

And finally, 2017 marks the 20th Birthday of Flintshire Local Voluntary Council. Our Third Sector Conference (7th September) and our Annual General Meeting (evening of 14th September) will include some reflections of the past 20 years.

NEW GRANT PROGRAMME OPENING AUTUMN 2017

Hanfod Cymru is a new national charitable fund exclusively for Wales, distributing the money raised for good causes by Loteri Cymru to strengthen community life in Wales.

Our aim is to support local projects, the length and breadth of Wales. As a generalist grant maker we will seek to reflect the needs and demands of those who apply to us but we will have an initial emphasis on general social needs, on the arts and creativity, and on educational projects.



We have structured our grant making in order to be able to respond to small community projects needing relatively modest sums, as well as to larger and more strategic ventures aimed at making a significant difference to people's lives.

We are established as an independent charity number 1172179 operating at arms' length from the operators of Loteri Cymru, in order to maximise the benefit for Wales of this exciting new development.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES PROGRAMME

The Community Facilities Programme is a capital grant scheme and can be used to improve community facilities which are useful to, and well used by, people in the community.

Grants are available at two levels; small grants of under £25,000 and larger grants of up to £250,000. The Programme is open to community and voluntary sector organisations, including social enterprises.

The focus of the Programme is on increasing opportunity, creating prosperity for all and developing resilient communities where people are engaged and empowered.

All applicants are expected to work with partners which can come from the public, private or the third sectors.

Priority will be given to applications from former Communities First cluster areas but applications from other areas will also be welcome and we expect to fund the best of these.

This workshop is offered under the Big Lottery funded Wales Development programme, through which local charities and community groups can learn to confidently run online fundraising campaigns. Participating groups will benefit from:

FREE membership of Localgiving for a year (usually £72) open to all local third sector groups – including those too small to be registered charities and therefore unable to subscribe to other online giving platforms

Face to face training, mentoring and support (tailored to your organisation's needs) to help you raise awareness of your cause and raise funds online

£200 of match funding (ring-fenced for every group that signs up) as an extra incentive to fundraise online!

'THE BIG STITCH UP' DELIVERS



Following the Knit a Square for Share initiative started by the JoY (Journey of Youth) team from the Estuary and Mountain Mission Area, The Big Stitch Up held in Holy Trinity Church, Greenfield has resulted in over 23 blankets donated to SHARE's work for refugees. Pupils from a number of schools contributed squares knitted by friends and families in the communities.

Pictured are pupils from Ysgol Maesglas representing the lunch time knitting club of over 30 pupils who met each day for weeks to produce over 300 squares. Flintshire Youth Volunteer Awards were granted to pupils who

had dedicated more than 10 hours of their time. Above are pictured the Silver Award winners who were chosen to deliver the 23 blankets in recognition of the 20 hours they had dedicated to the project. The JoY Group were granted Gold Awards for the 30 hours they had committed in the creation of the project reaching throughout the Mission Area from Lixwm to Whitford, Flint and Mostyn.

Blankets and squares are still coming in and there will be a second delivery to SHARE. You can still leave your contribution in Rhosesmor Church (CH7 6PJ) which is open every day.

COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

As Welsh Government continues its development of a Resilient Communities programme, WCVA is working with the sector to examine the concept of community resilience.

The Cabinet Secretary for Communities and Children, Carl Sargeant, has talked about the need for a new approach to building resilient communities. This includes a particular focus on what he calls the 'three Es' - early years, employability and empowerment. Over summer and beyond, WCVA will work with the sector to develop ideas and insights on what makes a resilient community, and help shape Welsh Government thinking on the role that the

sector can play in promoting resilience and empowerment.

We have now launched our Resilient Communities Hub, where our work on this area will be posted. This includes, initially, a joint discussion paper from WCVA and Talwrn, which draws on discussions WCVA has had with sector network, and a look at our Eisteddfod panel debate on resilient communities.

Our Community Garden is more than just planting seeds; it's about planting ideas, growing skills, and nurturing self-esteem.

We are also a local community-gathering place; that equips people with gardening skills, and how to grow their own food. From senior citizens and youth of all abilities and disabilities, they all benefit from this intergenerational, interactive project.

If you wander down a pathway to a blue gate you will encounter a wonderful surprise...

The Community Garden provides opportunities for creative success for all abilities and disabilities, by providing many hands-on learning experiences of gardening digging in the rich soil, learning about plants and developing gardening skills.

Together we slowly gain an understanding of how to



grow our own to the making of compost. Constructing different kinds of frames for growing vegetables and fruit, and learn about container growing. We enjoy recycling old pallets to be made into imaginative comfortable garden furniture. There really is something here for everyone to do and make.

We build habitats and feeding tables for our wild life that frequent the Garden.

Becoming aware of our wild life we hope will grow a natural affinity to nurture, an awareness of our ecology and how humans

affect and are affected by our natural environment. Therefore inspire a sense of stewardship and caring about our environment.

This year we are going to look at our story and design our own story pole. It will be good to develop our arts as a number of our boards on the fences are in need of repair.

We look forward to seeing you here one day in the not too distant future.

Voluntary organisations nominated volunteers who they wanted to receive 'National Volunteers' Week' certificates – volunteers without whom their organisation could not function.

As volunteers arrived in the Clwyd Room we were entertained by the choir 'SWAGG' which stands for 'Supporting Working Age Guys and Girls affected by cancer'. They sang popular songs that put us all in a good mood!!

YOUTH ARE FUNDERS ATTEND CARDIFF RESIDENTIAL



The Youth Are Funders group are made up of young people from all over Flintshire. Two young people from the group travelled to Cardiff for the residential and conference. They represented Flintshire to a great standard on this all Wales platform.

One of the group was part of a secret panel of judges who had been observing presentations from youth groups from all over Wales. Attached is a photograph of him giving feedback to a room of approximately 100 people. In the room there was young people from all over Wales, professionals from Welsh Government, local Youth Volunteer Advisors and many more. He was speaking about a youth group who had won a £100 voucher for standing out as being an excellent example of a Youth-Led volunteering project. The youth group that won was from Flintshire! MONEY MATTERS

Pension Age Increase brought forward

Six million men and women in their 40s will have to wait a year longer to get their state pension. The rise in the pension age to 68 will now be phased in between 2037 and 2039, rather than from 2044 as was originally proposed. Those affected are currently between the ages of 39 and 47.

Employer-Supported Childcare

Tax-Free Childcare is an alternative to the existing 'childcare voucher' scheme and includes the self-employed. For every £8 you pay in, the government will add an extra £2, up to £2,000 per child per year. Further information www.childcarechoices.gov.uk.



CHARITY COMMISSION
FOR ENGLAND AND WALES

The Charity Commission commissioned Populus to conduct independent research into trust and confidence in the Charity Commission.

- 31% of the public are aware that they have benefitted from or used a charity's services (up from 19% in 2015)
- 88% of the public agree that the Charity Commission's role is essential or very important
- 71% of the public agree that seeing a charity is registered reassures them
- 58% of the public and 77% of charities feel that charities are regulated effectively

Small charity accounts

The Commission found that in a sample of 109 small charity accounts scrutinised, 55% were of acceptable quality (47% was achieved in the previous 2 years).

Employment Tribunal fees ruled unlawful

The Supreme Court, which handed down its judgment on 26 July 2017, has ruled unanimously that employment tribunal fees are unlawful. The government will repay up to an estimated £32m.
