22nd Annual General Meeting

We were delighted to welcome all those that attended our Annual General Meeting at Theatre Clwyd in September.

Highlights of this year's meeting, opened by Councillor Marion Bateman, Chair of Flintshire Council, included a presentation to this year's winner of the Tom Jones Award for Youth Volunteering.

Testament to the value our young people add to the voluntary and community sector in Flintshire, competition for the Tom Jones Award was strong. The accolade went to James Reynolds who was nominated by the leader of Saltney Ferry Scout Group for his commitment and dedication to the young people within the group and the wider scout movement in Wales. In his nomination, Scout leader Robert Benyon's said "In all my 32 years of Scout leadership I have never had a more dedicated person assisting us in the group."

The judging panel recognised nominees Lacey Jones and Alex Nemes with high commendations. Lacey, a volunteer for the Volunteer Mentor Service within Flintshire County Council's Childrens' Social Service Department was nominated for her effectiveness in supporting two young people. Alex was nominated for his contribution to Active Cambria which includes providing physical activity sessions

for his peers and local children and recruiting and mentoring volunteers from within his peer group.

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Best Kept Communities Awards

Competition entrants give their time and share their skills to create and maintain communities for the benefit of all those living there. This ethos mirrors that adopted by the voluntary and community organisations we support at FLVC, so we welcomed the chance to coordinate the competition for the first time this year.

Chair of Flintshire County Council, Councillor Marion Bateman, opened the awards by explaining the competition aims to "...encourage local communities, villages and towns to work together as groups to improve their environment and to encourage local pride. Entrants contribute to making Flintshire a wonderful place in which to live, work and volunteer." The 2019 judging panel, made up of FLVC Trustee Pip Perry (MBE), Heather Price of North East Wales Heritage Forum, and John Whittaker, Senior Parks and Countyside Officer at Wrexham County Council, enjoyed travelling throughout the county in July appraising a total of 30 entries. Their search for well-kept and well-used village halls and community buildings, volunteer input, improvements or work in progress was fruitful. Testament to the high standard of entries, it proved difficult to decide on a winner in each of the six categories, with merit awards being granted in three categories.

The awards were handed out at our AGM, and the accompanying presentation showcasing the entries gave the event a wealth of beauty and vibrancy. We're already looking forward to Spring and the launch of next year's competition. Here's hoping we'll see an entry from your community.

"In March 2019, I put on my High Sheriff's Uniform for the first time. I joined my Chaplain the Reverend Andrea Jones at her beautiful St. Deiniols Church in Hawarden, along with the Church Choir, Flint Male Voice Choir and 150 guests and dignitaries for my service of declaration.

My shrieval year has been a delightful blend of insightful visits and special events in wonderful venues, together with the opportunity to meet so many outstanding people who make such a positive impact in our county. It is such a great honour to hold the office of High Sheriff and one which I will never forget.

So far in my year of being out and about in our "preserved county" of Clwyd, I have been shocked by the levels of deprivation and vulnerability that I find on our doorstep, but equally uplifted by the care, compassion and dedication that I have encountered all over the county.

I believe that in our world full of contradictions and outside pressures, Clwyd can be proud of itself and the large numbers of people who work in our statutory public services and charitable, not-for-profit sector, who do a remarkable job. I have seen this confirmed over and over again in places I have visited and ceremonies I have attended.

The word duty has cropped up a number of times this year, and I have felt humbled by what I have seen in the charitable and voluntary sector. So many people giving their time and knowledge with unstinting generosity because they see it as their duty, and I have seen people taking duty way beyond what is expected of them. My High Sheriffs Awards Evening in March 2020 will be the highlight of my year, recognising these unsung heroes."

Third Sector Support Wales (TSSW) is the organisation that draws all 19 county voluntary councils in Wales together. Its report on the sector's

Case Studies are used in the report to demonstrate that County Voluntary Councils (CVCs) have played an integral role in supporting new and existing third sector organisations and projects. Flintshire Early Health Hub is featured, and William, who volunteers for the Salvation Army in Mold, is quoted talking about how, through volunteering, he has improved his prospects in the job market, increased in confidence, and found many new friends.

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Funding surgeries – saving

you time, effort and money

Throughout the year, we've held surgeries support those seeking funding. Delivered partnership with funders, surgeries provide opportunity to gauge opinion on the likelil Throughout the year, we've held surgeries to support those seeking funding. Delivered in partnership with funders, surgeries provide an opportunity to gauge opinion on the likelihood of your bid succeeding, and to receive advice on how best to present your bid.

With recent research revealing that, despite the majority of applications failing, charities are investing significant resources in making bids, the benefits of attending a surgery are clear. It's satisfying to know that we've brought those that attend our surgeries closer to a grant award, or helped them to spend their valuable time and resources more productively. Subscribe to the FLVC e-bulletin to find out when the next surgery will be held. Demand for appointments is high so early booking is advisable.

Research conducted by Brevio, a collaborative working to create an easier, less risky and cheaper grant-making system, and the University of Bath revealed:

- Each charity or community group applies for an average of 22 grants per year
- In the last year, the average failure rate of grant applications was 63%
- It takes an average of 18 hours to complete a typical funding application
- Registered charities spend £1.1bn a year writing bids

Flintshire projects secure £987,000 from funding streams signposted by FLVC

Our Funding Outreach Officer Heather Hicks has helped charities and community and voluntary initiatives in the county attract a massive £987,000 in funding since April.

As well arranging and co-ordinating funding surgeries where attendees are signposted to the grant givers most likely to support an idea, and given tips on on how to present a bid, Heather responds to a raft of ad hoc enquiries from organisations needing money for a whole variety of reasons.

The success enjoyed by bidders in Flintshire is testament to Heather's extensive knowledge not only of funding streams, but also of what grant givers look for in the projects they support.

We're hopeful that, by the end of this financial year, we could have had a hand in successful bids exceeding £1m. If you've got a funding gap to plug, you know who to contact!

Silver lining as Sychdyn's Friday Club closes

As organisers closed the doors to Sychdyn's Friday Club for good, Heather enabled its formal dissolution by helping to distribute remaining funds to the following groups that meet in the village:

Heather said "It's pleasing that something positive came out of the closure of Friday Club. Those that ran the club were keen for remaining funds to benefit the village and I was only too happy to help make this happen."

Resources from Inspiring Impact help give bidders the edge with funders

Funded by the National Lottery Community Fund, the Inspiring Impact website draws together resources to help organisations and projects better understand and increase their impact. You'll find everything from how-to guides and self-assessment tools, to research reports, diagnostic tools and outcomes frameworks.

Heather Hicks said "Charitable Trusts and Foundations have seen an increase in requests for grants, but without any increase in budget, they have to make some difficult decisions. In reality this means that projects are competing against each other for limited funds. Applications for projects which bring the most benefit and have the most impact will be the successful ones."

Easy funding with Easyfundraising.org.uk

More than 3,700 online retailers are willing to thank customers for shopping with them online by making a donation to their chosen cause, and website Easyfundraising is the platform that makes it possible. Any good cause, from PTAs to charities, sports clubs to support groups, can register with Easyfundraising to receive donations from retailers, with contributions totalling £15 or more paid out every three months by bank transfer or cheque. Once you've registered, you can use the website's marketing tool kit to invite supporters to select you as the cause to benefit when they shop. The website's reporting function allows you to watch the donations accumulate.

Voluntary work skills sessions enhancing the University experience for students

Our volunteer centre has delivered accredited Voluntary Work Skills training to students studying at Glyndwr University. The university recognises that volunteering provides invaluable real-world experience for its students and Invited us to partner with them in providing undergraduates with an opportunity to consider and appreciate the skills, attributes and behaviours conducive to getting the most from a volunteer placement. We've also

shared information on where to find volunteering opportunities, and explored how best to secure one. The training has been well received by a cross-section of cohorts within the Faculty of Social and Life Sciences. Volunteering Development Officer Debbie Long said "Students have actively engaged in the training sessions and it's so encouraging to see that they appreciate how volunteering can benefit their personal development, compliment their academic studies and increase their prospects in the job market. We look forward to training more students from all faculties."

Cathy Hewins, Senior Lecturer Health and Wellbeing, said "Volunteering builds the confidence of our students to engage in the development of projects and interact with communities or groups of people they may have not considered working with. Students comment that volunteering is also beneficial to their academic studies as it helps with their time management and allows them to apply the theory they learn in a real world setting."

Young Volunteering Project brings Christmas cheer to care home residents

The Volunteer Centre continues to invite local people aged between 16 and 25 to join its four-week Young People's Supported Volunteering Project. The project provides an opportunity for young people to utilise their existing skills, and to learn new ones, by undertaking volunteer taster sessions with a range of initiatives throughout the county. Participants also work towards an OCN level one voluntary skills qualification.

In October, participants completed garden maintenance in Wepre Park, Connah's Quay, and at Wild Ground's Lane End Nature Reserve in Buckley. During its final session, the group prepared gift boxes for Age Cymru's Christmas Gift Box Appeal.

24 year old Johno joined the project to help fill his time during a period of unemployment. When asked what he'd enjoyed most about the experience, Johno said "It's been good to get out and about, to pick up new skills, and to get to know and to work with new people." The project has led to the prospect of a

volunteering placement where Johno can utilise his I.T. skills.

Alex studied horticulture at college until June, and joined the project on his journey to work readiness. The 22 year old said "I was irritated by doing nothing and was glad of the chance to apply my gardening skills. The project is easy going and relaxed, and I've enjoyed meeting new people. I've felt more positive since joining the project, and recently started to volunteer at a café. I'm hopeful that a period of volunteering can give me the confidence to take on paid work."

GOOD GOVERNANCE

Revised Code of Fundraising Practice came into effect on 1 October 2019

The Fundraising Regulator published the new code three months before it came into effect on 1st October. It takes into account the 114 responses received to a consultation focussed on making the code easier to use and to navigate.

The new code, which promises to be easy to digest, is available on the Funding Regulator's website, www.fundraisingregulator.org.uk.

Cyber Crime Awareness session offered during Charity Fraud Awareness Week 2019

The awareness week in October was marked with a session for local third sector groups and organisations about the crimes they may be

exposed to online, and the preventative measures they can take to remain safe. FLVC delivered this is partnership with North Wales Police and OWL Cymru.

Attendees were signposted to a wealth of information on how to protect, detect and respond to fraud committed against third sector organisations, including help sheets, case studies, webinars and tutorials. To find these resources, type "Charity Fraud Awareness Hub" into your search engine.

Have your say on the Charity Governance Code

A consultation on how to improve the current edition of the code, published in 2017, went live on 4th November 2019. In a bid to strike a balance between remaining current, and minimising disruption to those using the code, it's proposed that the main focus on the 2020 refresh is on the code's seven principles, with the consultation document outlining a case for urgent change in specific areas. The consultation closes on 28th February 2020. It can be accessed at www.charitygovernancecode.org.

Homegrown tips for good governance

Charity Commission updates safeguarding guidance

The guidance helps charity trustees to ensure that the safety of anyone who comes into contact with their charity is prioritised. The update reflects feedback from a consultation on its usefulness, and now includes:

- Practical steps to ensure policies and procedures are working
- More clarity on expectations around the need to undertake criminal records checks
- Advice on determining whether other checks are needed
- New practical resources from experts

Preparing for Brexit

Third sector capacity to prepare for Brexit has been built with the creation of the Wales Civil Society Forum of Brexit. Forum partners, Wales Council for Voluntary Action (WCVA) and Cardiff University, funded by the Legal Education Foundation, applied policy and legal expertise, and engaged with groups in Wales, to develop its findings. These were presented to Welsh Government as a series of asks. In response, former Cabinet Secretary for Finance and Local Government, Mark Drakeford said "..... I welcome the Forum's position paper as it will help the third sector consider the implications in a number of key areas, such as equality and human rights, immigration, EU citizenship and the environment and animal welfare."
